

ADDRESSING THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON WOMEN, GIRLS AND LGBTI PERSONS: POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PARLIAMENTARIANS

FIGHTING DISINFORMATION AND RAISING AWARENESS

Since the COVID-19 outbreak, some political and religious leaders have falsely blamed LGBTI communities for the pandemic, resulting in an increase of LGBTI-phobia around the world. Moreover, there has also been a lack of accurate and comprehensive data on the gendered impacts of the pandemic, which could inform policy-making and be used to raise awareness of the specific needs of women, girls and LGBTI persons.

Actions Parliamentarians can take:

- Create <u>information campaigns</u> specifically on the prevention of, and fight against violence;
- Speak out in parliament and <u>condemn harmful practices</u> against women and girls as well as anti-LGBTI hate speech and scapegoating;
- Call for the training of law enforcement officials and public servants in general to <u>not discriminate against</u> LGBTI persons and to instead proactively identify and report cases of abuse of power; and
- Call on relevant Ministries to collect comprehensive <u>age- and sex-disaggregated data</u> on the situation of women, girls and LGBTI persons during the pandemic.

Country-Specific Practices:

Asia

<u>South Korea:</u> After a cluster of new COVID-19 cases was traced to a prominent gay club in Itaewon resulting in increased homophobic sentiment, the government urged journalists and media personnel to exercise caution to prevent personal information from leaking.

Europe

<u>Spain:</u> The government published guidance for LGBTI persons on resources available to them, including economic, health and emotional support.

Latin America and the Caribbean

<u>Argentina:</u> The Congressional Budget Office published a detailed report on how the COVID-19 pandemic is widening the economic gender gap.
