PARLIAMENTARIANS FROM AROUND THE WORLD GATHER IN TBILISI, GEORGIA TO DISCUSS SMALL ARMS AND LIGHT WEAPONS CONTROLS AND REGULATION

Parliamentarians for Global Action (PGA), in association and with the support of the Parliament of Georgia, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE), The George Soros Foundation and Safer World is organizing a major Regional Parliamentary Workshop on Small Arms and Light Weapons in Tbilisi, Georgia from 9-10 June, 2006.

The main objective of this Workshop will be to sensitize Parliamentarians from Georgia and certain other CIS countries to the need to improve controls on Small Arms and Light Weapons transfers from the region and to better regulate arms sales generally. In this connection, participants will be able to draw upon the experience of Parliamentarians from other countries also invited to participate in this important event event.

By way of general background, the issue of Small Arms and Light Weapons regulation is one of particular importance in the region and is also high on the agenda at the United Nations in New York where a major Review Conference will take place at the end of June/early July 2006. This Workshop therefore provides a unique opportunity for legislators to agree on a Plan of Action containing priorities for the region and internationally in advance of this UN Conference.
