The ICC is encountering several problems in bringing to justice the persons bearing the greatest responsibility for the

most serious crimes of international concern.

Concerning Darfur, the Report that the ICC Prosecutor presented to the UN Security Council on 14 June 2006 demanded immediate and determined action to fight impunity and halt the violence in this region of Sudan. However, the ICC does not have any law enforcement agency at its disposal, as it relies on the police and other forces of States. Against this background, who will arrest Sudan's top officers should they be charged by the ICC with crimes against humanity, genocide or war crimes?

In and around Northern Uganda, the five leaders of the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) who have been accused of crimes against humanity by the ICC have fled to the Eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) and have been reported to have visited Southern Sudan, but they have not been arrested yet. Officials of MONUC (the UN Peacekeeping Mission in Congo) have had contacts with the LRA contingent, but no action was taken concerning arrests. Thus, who will intervene to arrest the LRA leaders and surrender them to the Court, as set out in the ICC Arrest Warrants?

This Strategy Meeting will analyse the role of States, the UN and other actors (e.g. Interpol) in implementing the ICC mandate to fight impunity, and identify gaps and loopholes in the existing international justice system. Parliamentarians will discuss the role that legislators can play in bringing about compliance by States, international organisations and non-state actors with the orders and decisions of the Court, as well as the impact that the ICC is having on peace-processes and crises-situations in which it is important to maximise the preventive effect of ICC interventions.

Ultimately, the goal of this event will be to re-focus the action of the 3 Working Groups of the *Consultative Assembly of Parliamentarians for the ICC and the Rule of Law*, the main project of the PGA ICC Campaign, which so far has contributed to the ratification of the Rome Statute by 57 out of the 100 States Parties to the ICC system.
