
What kind of city for Danica May Camacho?

- 1.8 billion cars
- 7 billion people
- 10 trips a day: walking or cycling account for > 1/3
- 23 billion NMT trips/day far exceed number of motor vehicle trips



Business As Usual: Unsustainable Transport

- By 2020 road fatalities, now 1.3 million/year (over 90% in developing countries, ½ are pedestrians & cyclists) grow 80% in low/mid-income countries
- By 2050 CO₂ emissions from transport up 300%
- Air pollution from transport contributes to premature deaths of at least 500,000 persons a year in developing world


