



Towards Effective Cooperation by the Security Council with the ICC: The Role of the ASP and of the States Parties

An assessment of the first 10 years of the Court reveals that considerable challenges remain to ensure the effective implementation of the mandate of the ICC: some of these challenges arise also in the context of the relationship of the Court with the UN Security Council. Building on the Report of the High-Level Meeting of Experts and Parliamentarians on the UN Security Council and the ICC (Chatham House-PGA, March 2012), and on numerous concrete recommendations put forward by states parties during the recent Security Council Open Debate on Peace and Justice convened by the Guatemalan Presidency on 17 October 2012, this ASP side-event seeks to galvanize agreement on a roadmap of action for states parties to ensure that the Security Council contributes most effectively to accountability for serious crimes, especially through referrals to and cooperation with the Court.
